PREVIOUS EXPERIENCE

As a B Med Sci student I spent one year working in a hospital immunology department. This department was involved in both the cellular and humoral aspects of immunology, being a supra regional protein reference centre. I was able to take part in routine laboratory work as well as current research and carried out my own research project into C1 esterase inhibitor deficiency.

GENERAL MEDICAL EXPERIENCE

Having decided as a medical student on a career in dermatology, I attempted to gain as much medical experience as possible doing

a wide variety of busy jobs. This included working in an infectious diseases unit, in chest medicine, cardiology, gastroenterology and endocrinology.

I also spent six months working on a coronary care unit and six months in a casualty department. During this time, experience was gained in a wide variety of practical procedures.

DERMATOLOGICAL EXPERIENCE

SENIOR HOUSE OFFICER

I spent six months in the Rupert Hallam Department of Dermatology, Sheffield, as part of a medical rotation. During this period I had responsibility for both inpatients and outpatients, attending dressings clinics, 4 new patient clinics and one minor operation clinic weekly.

REGISTRAR

I spent twenty months in the University Department of Dermatology, Royal Infirmary, Edinburgh. There were two registrars who alternated on a six monthly basis between responsibility for managing the 42-bed inpatient unit and an out patient commitment to the Victoria Hospital Kirkcaldy Fife. As the ward registrar, there was a daily ward round, a minimum of two outpatient clinics and one minor operating session weekly, there was also an academic meeting on Thursday afternoons. As the non-ward registrar, there was minimum of five outpatient clinics weekly and a minor operating session.

During my time in this department I was involved in a number of research projects including a study using monoclonal antibodies to stain the dermal inflammatory infiltrate and epidermal Langerhans cells in patients with atopic eczema, gaining experience in cutting frozen sections and monoclonal antibody staining with both horseradish peroxidase and alkaline phosphatase staining techniques. I also studied the cellular infiltrate at sites of intradermal prick tests in patients with atopic eczema, performed a study into the prevalence of food allergy in adults with atopic eczema, and studied changes in gut permeability associated with atopic eczema. Much of this work was supported with a grant from the Scottish Home and Health Department.

Senior Registrar

I did an average of eight clinics per week. This included minor operating sessions and contact dermatitis clinics. The department holds an academic afternoon on a Wednesday. This includes combined clinics, visiting lecturers, histology meetings and a journal club.

During my time in Sheffield I took the opportunity to visit Weston Park Hospital, to observe the use of radiotherapy in the treatment of skin cancer. I also took the opportunity to attend a number of genitourinary clinics. I had responsibility at times for reporting the direct immunofluorescence service provided by the department, and was able to attend diagnostic transmission electron microscopic studies with Prof. Bleehen.

As a recipient of a British Association of Dermatologists travelling fellowship award I was able to travel to North America in December 1988. During my stay I visited Boston and was able to attend various clinics including a pigmented lesion clinic, laser surgery clinics and dermatological surgery clinics. I was also able to attend the American Academy of Dermatology Annual meeting in Washington.

I was responsible for organising the North of England Dermatology Society meetings in Sheffield in June 1987 and March 1988 and in Bradford in 2007.

Teaching Experience.

I have been committed to the teaching of undergraduate medical students both in the outpatient clinic and on a formal lecture courses. I have supervised students doing special study modules and examined Leeds university medical students There are also occasional lectures to general practitioners, paramedical staff and MRCP candidates.

I attended a two-day teaching course Nov/Dec 1997 at Leeds entitled the skills of teaching and evaluating for medical supervisors.

RESEARCH INTERESTS

SENIOR REGISTRAR

I was involved in several research projects on dysplastic naevi particularly regarding their malignant potential. A variety of

morphological, histochemical and immunohistochemical techniques were utilised particularly markers for proliferation, in an attempt to type and assess the malignant potential of these lesions. I was in receipt of a grant from the special trustees of the former untied Sheffield Hospitals for much of this work which was to form the basis of my MD thesis.

I also utilised a non-invasive skin surface replication technique to investigate the skin surface microtopography in various skin disorders. Some of this work was done with the aid of computer assisted image analysis in conjunction with a B Med Sci student who successfully completed a degree in pathology. This work was extended to investigate the skin surface changes in relation to ageing and actinic damage, and to correlate surface microtopography with changes in the dermis following trauma and various surgical procedures.

I was involved in a number of other projects. These included an extensive epidemiological study into malignant melanoma in Sheffield, a study of the distribution of factor XIIIa staining cells in melanocytic lesions, and a comparative study between the thickness of malignant melanoma at presentation between Sheffield and Wangaratta, Northern Victoria.

CONSULTANT

I took up my consultant post in April 1990. I worked in this post full time until 2014 when I dropped to part time and ceased work in March 2020. My appointment was as consultant Dermatologist employed by the Bradford Hospitals NHS Trust and working a department with two other consultants. The department covers the Bradford, Airedale and Leeds West areas and serves a population of approximately 600 000.

During my time in the department I attempted to improve on the already excellent services offered and developed a range of patient information booklets, established Saturday morning eczema teach ins, an idea now adopted by the National Eczema Society for their road shows, and established a rapid access skin cancer clinic lesion clinic. We were been able to recruit the first skin cancer nurse specialist in Yorkshire.

We have also been able to develop a nurse led eczema service for children with atopic eczema.

We also developed a wide variety of nurse led services. The department continued to be at the forefront of service delivery development and was runner up in the dermatology department of the year competition in 2005.

I continued my interest in malignant melanoma and established the Yorkshire Region melanoma forum in 1991. This was a group of health care professionals who worked within the Yorkshire region and had an interest in melanoma. The group over the years launched a wide variety of initiatives in the areas of audit, research and service delivery and eventually became the Yorkshire cancer network site specific skin cancer group. I chaired this group from its inception until 2000 and took over the chair again in 2006 to help to implement the IOG published in Feb 2006 for skin cancer. This group always worked closely with the Yorkshire Cancer Registry to improve registration in the region, there was a histopathology link, an education subgroup and a nurses' group. The Forum meets three a year at Cookridge hospital.

In 1993 I became skin cancer co-ordinator for Bradford and Airedale. We had an active skin cancer action group in the area which has been involved in a number of projects to enhance public awareness of the dangers of excessive sun exposure and the risks of skin cancer. As an extension of this work from 1994-2000 I was involved in the production and editing of a quarterly newsletter produced by the British Association of Dermatologists, which was circulated to all skin cancer co-ordinators. At this time I was also a member of the UK skin cancer working group, a multidisciplinary group which met bimonthly to discuss matters related to skin cancer and worked closely with the Health Education Authority to co-ordinate 'sun awareness week'.

I have been involved in conjunction with the Wolfson computer laboratory; University of Birmingham in the development of a computer program designed to aid general practitioners in the differential diagnosis of pigmented lesions.

I have an interest in the management of atopic eczema particularly in children. This led to the inception of Saturday morning eczema 'Teach Ins'. These were so successful that they were adopted by the National Eczema Society who ran similarly organised 'Road Shows'. I have also worked closely with the National Eczema Society in an advisory capacity, particularly on the use of emollients and topical steroids, and helped design and write their information sheet on the safe use of topical steroids.

My involvement with the National Eczema Society also led to my being invited to be a member of the all-party parliamentary working group on the skin and I attended a number of meetings of this group at the houses of parliament beginning in 1996.

I was undergraduate tutor for Bradford from 1994-2002. This was basically an organisational role running the undergraduate office which has responsibility for co-ordinating the teaching of medical students from both Sheffield and Leeds, and arranging elective periods for foreign medical students who wish to visit Bradford. With the successful joint bid between Bradford and Leeds universities for medical school expansion I was heavily involved with the development of this link. This has included working on the development of a new teaching facility on the Bradford Royal Infirmary site, the rebuilding of extensive student accommodation and the appointment of academic staff within the trust.

I had responsibility for organising the MRCP teaching rota for Bradford hospital from 1992-1997.

As part of my work in the field of health promotion, I was able to attend a one-day conference on health promotion and the media organised by the health education authority in London on 29th April 1997.

From 2006 until April 2015 I was lead clinician for the dermatology service and remained lead clinician for the hospitals skin cancer services until my retirement. For a 2 year period 2001-2003 the department was involved in the European Perusing Perfection project for which I was lead for the dermatology service.

In 2005-2007 I part supervised a PhD student studying the psychological aspects of delayed presentation with skin cancer and with a post doctoral research fellow involved in a national study on disfigurement.

I have been a spokesperson for the British Skin Foundation, I am a trained appraiser and educational supervisor. I have sat on accreditation panels for GPs with a special interest. I have attended interview panels in the North of England for consultant dermatologist posts on behalf of the Royal College of Physicians. I am a patron of the national charity British association of skin camouflage and gave a keynote speech at their 25th anniversary conference 9th October 2010 in Manchester UK.

I am a trustee of the Bradford Airedale and Wharfedale dermatology charity trust which I founded and clinical representative on the Skin charity board of directors (see www.skcin.org)

In 2007 I was made an honorary senior research fellow, University of Bradford School of Health Studies and a senior lecturer university of Leeds. I was also a member of the Bradford Centre for skin sciences and a member of the Bradford Institute

for Health Research I was for a period of time also an honorary clinical fellow University of Wales and teach on the Cardiff dermatology diploma course.

In 2007 I worked closely with Bradford tPCT to develop pathways for skin cancer services. This work got to the finals of the Health Service Journal awards 2007 and was presented at the teaching PCTs national conference November 2007

I attended a 3 day course November 2009 National Advanced Communications Skill Training Programme

I am a trained skin cancer peer reviewer working for the northern zone cancer team I peer reviewed Carlisle skin cancer services from November 2011 to September 2015

Attended one day educational supervisors classroom session 20.1.10 at Dewsbury district general hospital

In September 2011 I co hosted with the Bradford Centre for Skin Sciences a public education forum 'the good, the bad and the ugly' about skin cancer and ultraviolet light as part of the British Science Festival.

Since 2020 I have been a member of the National Eczema Society's Medical Advisory Board

In 2014 I became part time in my Bradford based NHS post and ceased NHS clinical practice in April 2020. I continue to undertake a variety of dermatology outpatient clinics. and to undertake forensic dermatology.

Current research

From 2004 I was an honorary visiting senior research fellow Bradford University and Senior Lecturer Leeds University. In June 2012 I was made Honorary visiting Professor Centre for Skin Sciences Bradford university.

I am also an associate member of the Centre for Skin Sciences Bradford University and Associate Clinical Director. From 2006 to 2020 I was a member of the Bradford Institute for health research. I am a member of the UK dermatology clinical trials network and the national institute for clinical research. In 2015 I took on the role of associate clinical director for the centre for Skin Science University of Bradford.

I am currently a member of the advisory board for a nation group coordinating research on the skin microbiome

Our department was one of the leading contributors to the Badbir biologics register and recruiting to the Bstop study and Impap studies.

I was instrumental in establishing a research unit within the dermatology service in Bradford with 3 research nurses and a part time trials coordinator , sharing a senior lecturers post with Leeds university and have a part time research doctor, we hope to appoint a further senior lecturer in the near future. The team were involved in a large number of commercial and portfolio trials these include.

1. Stop gap a study designed to compare the use of cyclosporine and prednisolone for pyoderma gangrenosum
2. Blister a study designed to compare the use of prednisolone and doxycycline for bullous pemphigoid
3. Trial of altoderm cream in atopic eczema
4. Trial optimisation of dovobet gel treatment start date June 2012
5. Long term study on safety of picato in treatment of actinic keratosis (leo sponsored)
6. Signature study investigating efficacy of secukinumab (Novartis study)
7. Hilight trial in treatment of vitiligo (NIHR portfolio study)
8. Alpha study investigating treatment of hand eczema
9. BADBIR contribution including Imap and Bstop studies
10. I was chief investigator for step-in psoriasis treatment trial
